
Ingrained in Grains

Ingrained in Grains is a visual exploration of the cultural and social practices surrounding rice in Indonesia, grounded in fieldwork observations in Jakarta. This project investigates how people engage with rice not just as a staple food, but as a marker of memory, tradition, and connection.

From sourcing it in traditional markets to the rituals of cooking and eating, Ingrained in Grains traces how rice is held, wrapped, and shared in everyday life. Through surface such as the textures and symbolism found in rice sacks and through the grain itself, as it moves from field to table, it reveals the shifting identities and deep rooted meanings carried within each grain.

Background

CULTURAL SIGNIFICANCE



Rice is deeply rooted in Indonesia's traditions and identity, symbolizing prosperity, fertility, and gratitude toward nature. It holds a sacred role in rituals and mythology. As both a daily staple and ceremonial offering, rice connects communities, reinforces respect for nature, and serves as a spiritual and cultural foundation across generations.

SOCIAL DIVIDES




Rice consumption in Indonesia reflects clear socioeconomic patterns.
Higher-income groups often purchase premium, imported, or specialty rice from supermarkets, while lower-income households rely on cheaper bulk grains from traditional markets. This consumption pattern highlights rice as not only a food source but also a symbol of wealth, status, and access, revealing deeper class divisions.

UNIFYING SYMBOL



In a society with varying literacy levels, visual communication becomes essential. Rice's presence in public visuals strengthens its role as a unifying cultural symbol. Rice serves as a bridge across gaps in education, class, and tradition. Its visual and cultural significance continues to shape social dynamics in Indonesia, reflecting both unity and disparity within the nation.



Framework of Explorations

Structured into three interconnected parts:
Hold, Wrap, and Share. Ingrained in Grains
traces different moment in rice's journey
from the hands that harvest it to the rituals
that bring people together around it.

By breaking down this journey, the project invites viewers to see rice not just as food, but as a medium of labor, identity, and belonging. It highlights how rice is woven into daily gestures, visual symbols, and communal traditions, deeply embedding it into the fabric of Indonesian life.


Fieldwork Report








Wrap



Building on the archive I have collected on the last semester, Wrapped focuses on 12 rice sacks found in traditional markets (pasar), highlighting their symbolic richness and aesthetic diversity. The work extracts intricate motifs and repurposes them into visual patterns. These patterns rooted in local design language and visual culture, become a tool to understand how rice sacks act as vessels of identity, commerce, and daily life.


I draw inspiration from the humble "nasi bungkus" an everyday economic rice meal, wrapped simply in brown paper, yet rich with layers of meaning. Through a folded poster format, I invite close observation of patterns and symbols that echo the textures of these wrappings. The folds and creases symbolize the intersections of food, identity, and social status, how something as simple as a packet of rice can quietly reveal stories of class, culture, and community.a canvas of social meaning.

This work takes an abstract approach, using observation as a method to explore how rice can act as a unifying symbol. By visually weaving together different rice sack designs into a single folded poster, the project highlights the idea that despite differences in origin, branding, or quality, rice connects people across social classes. 

The work portrays rice as an endless blessing from nature to the nation, symbolized by golden grains against a blue sky, prosperity descending from the heavens.


